The Vicar of K in 1570 was Griffin Smith  
but as it was a peculiar belonging to Lincoln Diocese  
few particulars regarding its history are to be found at  
Peterborough. There was a plentiful crop of lawsuits  
brought on in the later century xvi where investigation  
should throw considerable light on the history of  
the village.
